Dear Majority Leader Schumer, Speaker, Johnson, Minority Leader McConnell, and Minority Leader Jeffries:

As leading national correctional organizations, we write to express our strong support for the reauthorization of the Undetectable Firearms Act (UFA), a bipartisan piece of legislation which President Reagan signed into law in 1988. The UFA prohibits the manufacture, import, transfer, or possession of firearms made from plastic and other materials that are undetectable in a metal detector or an x-ray machine. Reauthorization of the UFA would ensure that the 35-year restriction on these firearms continues past its current expiry of March 8, 2024, and would prevent significant public safety and security risks that would follow a lapse in the UFA.

Together, our organizations represent over 400,000 correctional professionals across the country, as well as all executive-level appointed correctional leaders who manage the operations of our nation's major correctional systems. We collectively oversee approximately eight million incarcerated individuals, probationers, and parolees, and security checkpoints play an integral role in keeping our facilities safe and secure.

As you may know, corrections, like many other industries, is experiencing a workforce shortage that poses increasing challenges to an already difficult job. Correctional staff need every tool at their disposal to safeguard our correctional institutions, including the UFA. Our members are deeply concerned by the substantial safety and security risks that would come with a lapse in restrictions of undetectable firearms. The possibility of undetectable firearms entering our facilities would significantly impede upon our members' ability to keep our prisons and jails safe and would put countless lives at risk.

We strongly urge you to reauthorize this important legislation and to ensure the safety of hundreds of thousands of correctional professionals, along with the millions of people whom our members tirelessly work to supervise.
